Her parents were Holden and Helen Welsh of Iowa Falls, and her father was the president of Boyt Division Welsh Sporting Goods until 1979. Dianne graduated from Iowa Falls High School and went on to the University of Iowa, Emporia State University and the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, where she earned her PhD. Her parents created soft-sided luggage that revolutionized the luggage industry.

Welsh receives award for lifetime achievement

The United States Association for Small Business and Entrepreneurship (US-ASBE) presented Dianne H.B. Welsh, PhD, with the Max S. Wortman, Jr. Lifetime Achievement Award for Entrepreneurship and Dr. Charles H. Matthews with the USASBE Entrepreneurship Educator of the Year Award as part of the USASBE 2024: Forging the Future Together annual conference held in Birmingham, Ala., in

Dr. Welsh is the Hayes Distinguished Professor of Entrepreneurship at the University of North Carolina Greensboro. She is a known scholar in entrepreneurship, family business, and franchising. She is past president of the Small Business Institute®, past division chair for the Technology and Innovation Management Division of the Academy of Management, and past president and Justin G. Longenecker Fellow of USASBE.

Dr. Welsh was also invited by the United Nations to present the keynote address on Women and Entrepreneurship and served on the first NC Innovation Council.

In addition, she served as a Presidential Appointee to the USAF Academy. Dr. Welsh was the architect of the University of North Carolina at Greensboro's Entrepreneurship Program and founder of both the Southern Entrepreneurship in the Arts Conferences in Tampa, Fla., and Greensboro, N.C.

Dr. Welsh has published 130 journal articles and eight books, including the go-to book for cross-campus entrepreneurship programs, Creative Cross-Disciplinary Entrepreneurship.

Jill Kickul, professor of entrepreneurship at the University of Southern California Marshall School of Business, presented the award to Dr. Welsh at the conference.

"Dianne has been a prolific researcher, educator, and program builder for our discipline," Kickul said. "The range of courses she has taught both locally in her community as well as internationally is astounding."

Established in 2004 and presented annually, the Max S. Wortman, Jr. Lifetime Achievement Award for Entrepreneurship is the organization's highest individual honor and recognizes a deserving individual or organization for a career spent consistently and enthusiastically pursuing the highest of entrepreneurial ideals via academic study, pedagogy, or venture creation.

Previous award winners include GMF Academic Advisors, LLC's Dr. Geralyn McClure Franklin (2023); and Indiana University's Dr. Donald (Dr. K) Kuratko (2022). ■

With more than 40 years of experience across the emergency medical and fire services; healthcare, and continued education industries, Craighton is considered an expert in emergency central communications/

management, preparedness, safety, hazmat, flammable liquids training, and EMS. His services are often utilized in conflict resolution for public safety; within safety and security companies of all sizes; and serving those seeking assistance with personnel issues, business ethics, budgeting, grants, crisis management, and problem-solving.

Craighton has held many leadership positions with Franklin County **Emergency Management**; Franklin General Hospital; and Coulter Volunteer Fire Department. As the first full-time Franklin County **Emergency Management** Coordinator, Craighton was tasked with establishing the role, launching the individual county **Emergency Management** office, and setting up 911

He is currently serving in concurrent roles as a Hardin County Emergency Management Director; a Medicolegal Death Investigator for Hardin County; and is Training Specialist I with the Iowa State Fire Marshal, Fire Service Training Bureau. Craighton served as

Commercial ag course set in Iowa Falls, Hampton

Towa State University Extension **L** and Outreach Hardin County will host a Commercial Ag Weed, Insect, and Plant Disease Pest Control Continuing Instruction Course (CIC) for commercial pesticide applicators Wednesday, Feb. 14 in Iowa Falls, and Wednesday, Feb. 21 in Hampton. The program, provided by the ISU Extension and Outreach Pesticide Safety Education Program (PSEP), is also available at office locations across Iowa.

In Iowa Falls, the local attendance site is at Ellsworth Community College Ag Building at the Hardin County Extension Office. Pre-registration is be required athttps://www.extension. iastate.edu/hardin. Walk-ins are not guaranteed admission. The course runs from 9 to 11:30 a.m. The registration fees apply on or before Feb. 7, and go up after Feb. 7. To register or to obtain additional information about the CIC, contact the ISU Extension and Outreach Hardin County office at 641-648-4850.

In Hampton, the local attendance site is 6 2nd St. NW. Preregistration is required. Walk-ins are not guaranteed admission. The course runs from 9 to 11:30 a.m. The registration fee is \$45 on or before Feb. 14, and \$55 after Feb. 14. To register or to obtain additional information about the CIC, contact Traci Kloetzer at the ISU Extension and Outreach Franklin County office at 641-456-4811.

The course will provide continuing instruction credit for commercial pesticide applicators certified in categories 1A, 1B, and 1C. Topics covered will include application equipment use, maintenance, and calibration; safe application techniques; and pests, pest management, and pesticides.

Certified Crop Adviser (CCA) Continuing Education Units (CEUs) will be offered at this program. Interested participants should bring their CCA number.
