Bedford Wrestling Recap

The 2023-2024 wrestling season has come to an end. The Bulldogs will say good bye to lone senior Izaak Dukes. Here is a breakdown of the wrestlers records. Junior Lane Mason 138 pounds finished with a record of 12-26 with 10 pins. Junior Caden Mann finished the season with a 19-18 record recording 15 pins at 144 pounds. Junior Quentin Cavin wrestled 285 pounds finished 11-28 with 7 pins. Senior Izaak Dukes finished 23-11 with 14 pins. Junior Graham Godsey wrestled 190 pounds finishing 17-10 with 7 pins. Sophomore Kase Coleman finished 4-18 with 2 pins at 150 pounds. Freshman Trace Ewart finished 5-25 at 157 pounds.

KMA Honors for Lady Bulldogs Sophomore Lexi Perkins has been recognized by

KMA as she earned All-Sophomore Team.

Perkins led the Lady Bulldogs, 4-9, to a seventh place finish in the conference. In conference action, she was second with 142 rebounds and 10th with 169 points. She was 11th in field goal percentage, 45.8%, and free throw percentage, 62.8%. She was also one of only two players in the conference to average a double-double with 13 points per game and 10.9 rebounds per game.

Freshman Aniya Hardee and Caroline Simmons both earned All-Reserve Team honors. Hardee finished with 122 points, 77 rebounds, 54 assists, 46 steals and 7 blocks. Simmons scored 99 points (18 3-pointers), 26 rebounds, 21 steals and 8 assists for the Lady Bulldogs. Congratulations to these Lady Bulldogs for earning these KMA honors.

After the success of the Bulldogs season, many Bulldogs were recognized by KMA earning All-KMA honors.

Coach Tanner Peterman was selected as KMA Pride of Iowa Coach of the year. Peterman led the Bulldogs to a record of 23-3, which included a 13-0 POI championship, a district championship and a substate finals appearance.

Junior Cal Peterman was selected to the All POI Elite team. Peterman finished eighth in the conference as he scored 194 points, fourth with 53 made free throws and a 1.61 assist to turnover ratio, fifth in rebounds with 112, second in assists with 53, eighth in steals with 35 and seventh with 15 blocks for the conference champs.

Peterman was also selected to the All-Junior team along side fellow junior Brody King. King led the conference with 41 made 3-pointers while shooting 33.1%. He finished 12th in the POI with 169 points, 13th in assist to turnover ratio at 1.19 also had 45 rebounds, 25 assists and 19 steals in conference action for the POI champs.

King was also elected to the All 3-Point Team. Freshman Quentin Dalton was selected to the All-Freshman team, Quentin saw action in 16 varsity games and scored 20 points, with six boards and four steals.

Peterman and senior Conner Nally were both recognized on the all defensive team as Peterman had 74 steals and 22 blocks on the season. Nally often matched up with the leading scorer for the opposing team and shut them down with 80 steals on the season.

Junior Marcus Knighton earned All-Reserve team as he scored 203 points with 41 3-pointers, 80 rebounds, 32 assists, 27 steals and 13 blocks.

Kase placed third in the long jump with a leap of 21-03.50 and just missed placing in the 200 Meter with a ninth place finish and a time of 24.25. Kase also competed in the 60 Meter and placed 22nd with a time of 7.58.

Camden ran the 1600 Meter and placed 16th with a time of 5:26.99. The meet featured athletes from over 30 schools.

State audit report notes several findings for City of Conway

State Auditor Rob Sand released an audit report on the City of Conway recently.

During the audit, city they observed council minutes, obtained city's internal controls to determine if proper procedures control are in place, observed coverage, bond surety city clerk's financial reports selected and bank reconciliations, scanned city funds, 2023 Annual observed Financial Report, scanned depository resolutions, traced receipts, traced selected disbursements to proper approval, traced selected payroll and related transactions to proper authorization and accurate accounting, and observed annual certified budget.

The audit identified various findings recommendations the city. Those findings include:

-Segregation of duties – independent reviews of reconciliations should be documented by the signature or initials of the reviewer and the date of review.

-Electronic check retention Code of Iowa allows the city to retain cancelled checks in an electronic format and requires retention in this manner to include an image of both the front and back of each cancelled check. The city does not receive an image of the back of each cancelled check.

-City council minutes

- minutes of council meetings were posted, they did not include the total disbursements by fund or a summary of all receipts as required by the Code of Iowa.

-Annual financial report – the Code of Iowa requires the city's annual financial report contain a summary for the preceding fiscal year of all collections and receipts, all accounts due the city and all expenditures. The city's fiscal year 2023 annual financial report reported disbursements and fund balances which do not agree with the city's records.


-Local Option Sales Tax - The city's local option sales tax ballot requires 100% of LOST collections be allocated for property tax relief. The city has not properly tracked the use and unspent balance of LOST collections to demonstrate compliance with the ballot requirements.

-Dual compensation Code of Iowa states an elected officer is entitled to receive any other compensation for any other city office or city employment during that officer's tenure in office but may be reimbursed for actual expenses incurred. For the period January 1, 2023 through December 31, 2023, a city council member was paid \$850 for mowing, clearing snow and minor maintenance of city-owned equipment. compensation violates Chapter 372.13(8) of the Code of Iowa, which prohibits elected officials from receiving compensation as a city employee.

-Charge account – The city has a charge account used to purchase fuel for the city lawnmower and snow plow. The city has not adopted a formal policy to regulate the use of the charge account.

-Checks signed in advance - The mayor and the city clerk are required to sign all checks upon receipt and review of supporting documentation. The mayor signs checks in advance.

Recommendations were made to the city by the state auditor and no response from the city was necessary because it was an agreed-upon procedure.
